

Inscription Requirements:

- Bricks may ONLY be inscribed with three options:
 - o "Name" (e.g. "John Doe")
 - o "In Memory of" (e.g. "In Memory of John Doe")
 - o "In Honor of" (e.g. "In Honor of John Doe")
- No Inscriptions beyond these are allowed.
- Donors will be notified if changes in the requested inscription are required to conform to inscription standards.
- The inscribed bricks become the property of CHB.
- CHB will determine the final placement of the bricks.

The Charlotte Hawkins Brown Museum is proud to re-introduce the Alice Freeman Palmer Plaza as our new Donor Plaza!

As part of largescale repairs and upgrades to the property in the early 2000s, the AFP Plaza (a brick and cement plaza) was constructed in the footprint of the original Alice Freeman Palmer building on the school's campus.

The original AFP building was built in 1921 and served as the main classroom building at Palmer. The largest and first building in town to have indoor plumbing and electricity, AFP was an architectural marvel in the small town of Sedalia. Holding offices, classrooms, an auditorium, a library, and an art gallery, the AFP was the heart of the campus.

In February 1971, the building caught fire and burned beyond repair. Today, you can still see some of the 225,000 bricks, handmade by Palmer students, outlining the footprint of the building. Inside of that footprint sits the AFP Plaza, which will now be used as a space to commemorate financial donors.
