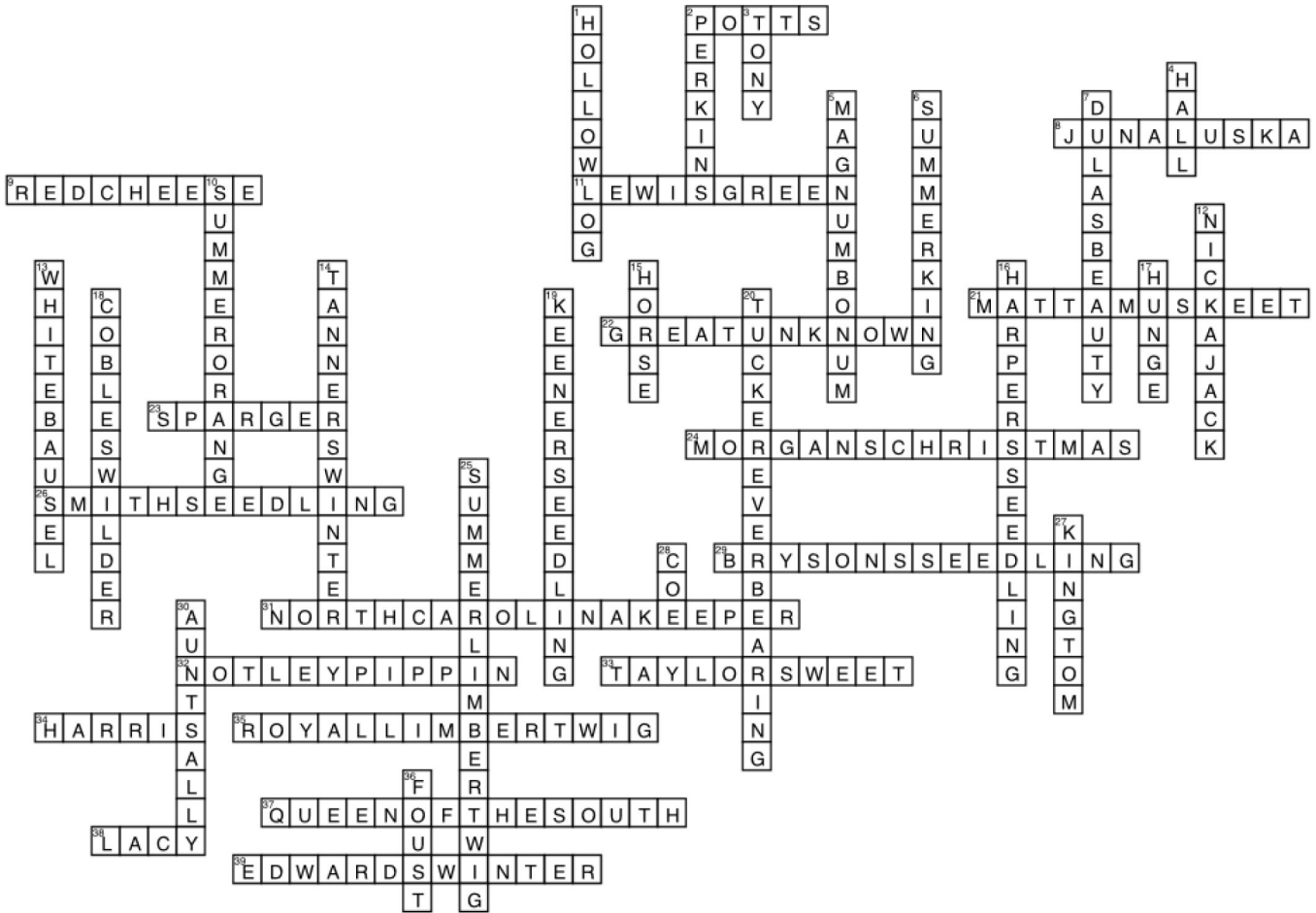


NC Heirloom Apple Varieties

ACROSS

- This apple was grown in the Brushy Mountains of NC.
- The name of North Carolina's largest natural lake. Also the favorite apple grown in the orchard of a Cherokee Indian Chief.
- This apple variety might sound good to mice.
- ____ and Clark, plus a color make up this apple's name.
- This variety probably originated as a seedling in Hyde Co, in extreme eastern NC. An old legend says the apple seed was taken from the gizzard of a wild goose by the ____ Indians.
- A large question mark hangs over this apple's name.
- This apple was the first apple variety planted in the Southern Heritage Apple Orchard. It originated in Surry County, home of this orchard.
- This apple's name includes the name of a famous silver dollar and an annual holiday.
- This apple originated in Stokes County, NC.
- Jackson County, NC was home to this apple.
- An apple that bears our state's name and keeps well through the winter.
- An 1863 Pennsylvania nursery catalog attributes the origin of this apple to NC. This apple appears to be identical to Gloria Mundi.
- The name of this apple includes the first name of a pop singer and is not tart, but ____.
- The only Rockingham County apple on this list.
- This apple originated in the county named for Sir George Carteret, one of the 17th century English Lords Proprietor.
- Originated circa 1860 ten miles south of Greensboro, NC.
- A plant: Queen Anne's _____, minus an "e," plus a "y" at the end.
- Like Summer Orange, this apple is claimed by Chatham County, NC.

DOWN

- The name of this apple could describe a place where a small animal might hide from a predator.
- The only Burke County apple on the list.
- This apple bears the same name as an award given out for outstanding achievement in live Broadway theatre.
- A Franklin County apple.
- One of the most famous apples. Attributed to Davidson County, NC.
- This apple's names include a season of the year and a royal title. It is believed to have originated in NC.
- Originated in the late 1800s in Lenoir, Caldwell County NC from Limbertwig seeds that had been planted to grow rootstocks for grafting.
- This variety's name includes a season of the year and the name of a fruit.
- Macon County, NC can claim six apple varieties: Bald Mountain, Beecher, Camack's Sweet, Cullasaga, Great Unknown, and ____.
- This apple is claimed by Ashe County, NC.
- This is the only apple on our list attributed to Granville County, NC.
- Man o'War, Seabiscuit, and Secretariat would like the name of this apple.
- A Forsyth County apple.
- Described at an NC American Pomological Society Meeting as "an old North Carolina variety," but was listed by a Norfolk, VA nursery in 1805. Tastes like a strawberry and is now growing in Africa.
- Originated on the North State Nursery Company Farm in Julian, NC.
- Lincoln County, NC claims this apple variety.
- The only apple on this list from Cumberland County, NC.
- This apple's name includes a season of the year and the name of a particular family of apples.
- Attributed to NC, but in fact may be of SC origin.
- Listed in 1901 and 1910 Greensboro Nursery catalogs. The shortest name on this list.
- Three NC counties are referenced as being the place of origin for this apple.
- Also known as Faust and Faust's Winter.
